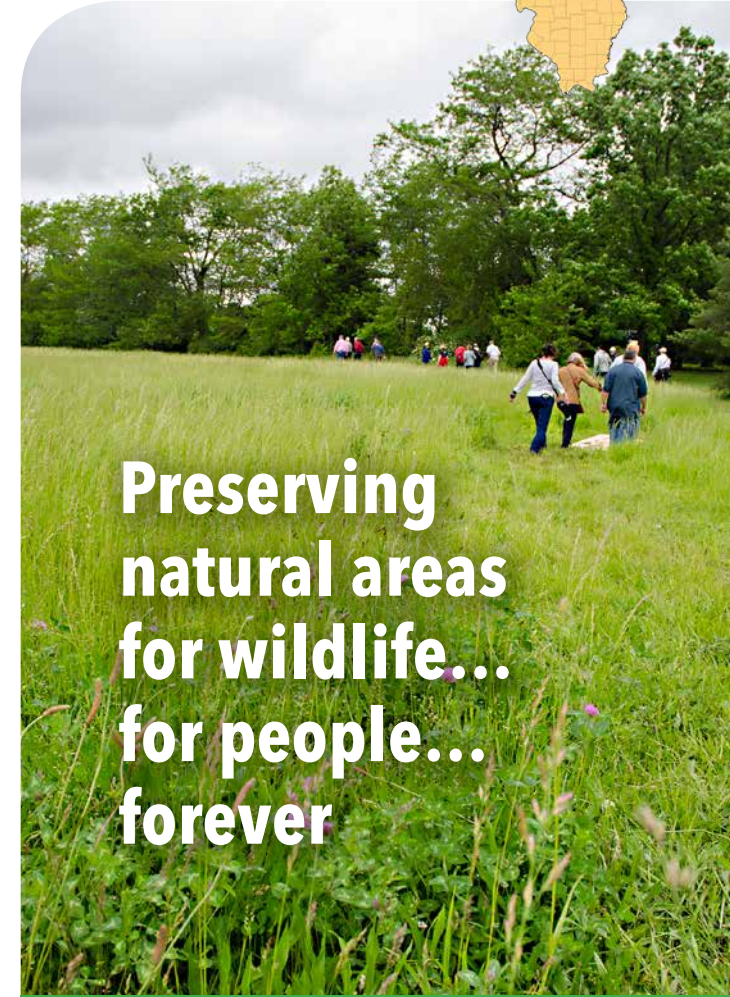

SANGAMON RIVER CORRIDOR RESERVE



OUR CURRENT FOCUS

The Sangamon River Corridor Reserve is the keystone in LCF's vision of an interconnected corridor of preserved land from Allerton Park to Lodge Park, benefiting wildlife and expanding opportunities for people to connect with nature.

ON THIS 108-ACRE TRACT along the Sangamon River in Piatt County, just west of Monticello, LCF is restoring 59 acres of former farmland to floodplain forest.

The Bruce Hannon Levee Trail offers access to the river and close-up views of the restored floodplain along a 2.3-mile loop.

Visitors are welcome to hike, birdwatch, research, and explore the river's riches. A fun, educational guided tour is available in the Prairie State Hike App.

The site was acquired in 2012 with support from grants, private gifts, and volunteers.

BRADY PROPERTY



HERONS NEST along the Sangamon River on this 20-acre property in Piatt County, just east of Sangamon River Park, donated by Charlotte and Dan Brady in 2015.

This wet floodplain forest springs to life with an abundance of spring wildflowers under a canopy of large sycamore, silver maple, and hackberry trees.

METTLER WOODS



THIS 87-ACRE UPLAND forest remnant in DeWitt County, west of Clinton, is dominated by white oak trees, hickories, and other native oak species.

Dedicated as a Nature Preserve in 2004, it was donated to LCF by the Nature Conservancy in 2005. Public access is provided via a 0.6-mile trail.
